1. Deal all the wooden blocks to the players evenly.
2. Working together, build the "jenga" tower in book order. The person with the book that goes on the stack next, adds the block to the stack.
3. After the tower is built, play begins with the youngest player and continues to the oldest.
4. After a player removes a block, he reads the name of the book on the side of the block, recites the book before and after it, and places it on top of the tower.
5. Play continues until the tower falls.
6. After the tower falls, players work together to build the tower in book order again to either play a second time or put away in the box.

Note: For the New Testament set, the extra blocks were used to teach the classifications. These blocks may be built on at the beginning or end of the tower. When a player draws one of these blocks, a player may try to tell whether the block belongs in the Old or New Testament or list a book included in that group.

## Additional Tip:

Like regular Jenga, the tower is built by arranging 3 tiles for the base, adding 3 tiles on top of that in the opposite direction, 3 more in the opposite direction, and so on.

Players may request help reading the book of the Bible on their block, and may look at the chart for assistance reciting the preceding and following books.

Once players are able to build the tower in order easily, play may be switched to building the tower in reverse order.

After players have mastered the Old and New Testament sets independently, play may be adapted to use both sets simultaneously, building two separate towers by dealing all the blocks, players separating their blocks by Old or New, building one tower and then the other, and then choosing which tower to play on during their turn, and playing until both towers fall.
